I am fortunate to be able to work with so many of you on various committees throughout the year; to worship with you as we lift up our voices in song and our hearts in prayer; to enjoy fellowship with you at various wider church events or sit at table with you at a mission trip spaghetti supper or at our spring and fall picnics – outdoors was great this year; to learn with you as we discuss a particular topic at our adult study classes; to serve with you as we participate on a mission project, such as walking in the annual CROP Walk. I know that we all rejoice in having the people we do and surely there are those among us who give of themselves quite generously and deserve our great thanks.

Much of my time revolves around my preparations for Sunday and seasonal worship, study group, confirmation class, committee meetings, as well as my work under the heading of pastoral care, including visitations, baptisms, weddings, counseling, and funeral or memorial services. LENT — a time for change...

The church season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 22nd. Lent is a wonderful time for self-examination and offers us an opportunity to reprioritize our lives ultimately leading to important growth and transformation. Lent lasts for 40 days, including six Sundays, and ends on Easter Sunday, April 8th.



In Worship Centers, the color of the altar changes to purple to signify this period of waiting and change. Our classes will be extinguishing six candles, one for each Sunday in Lent, and burying the alleluia. We “bury the alleluia” (the Easter word of celebration) at the start of Lent, as a sign that we know we are preparing our hearts for the time when Jesus will die on the cross. Shouts of Alleluia will be heard again when we celebrate the resurrection on Easter.

Our 5th grade class will begin working on their Lenten service project during February, March and April. This has been a traditional part of our 5th grade curriculum. We support their “service attitude” and hope to encourage a lifelong practice of serving others. Keep an eye out for how you too can support our 5th graders in their Lenten mission.

In January our adult study group began a study of the Gospel of Mark, and in the fall we read and discussed the book *If Grace Is True*.

Of course, we can never be too boastful about the music program at our church. What a joy and inspiration to listen to our choir members and bell ringers throughout the year. What has also become very popular is their spring music concert. Many thanks go to Sylvia, Janet, Ed, and April for their work with our dedicated and talented singers and musicians.

Children's Sunday and the Christmas tableau presentation highlighted the personalities and contributions of the children within our church family. How precious they are and how grateful we all are for their teachers and all church school helpers and most especially for the leadership of Amy and our newest staff member, Michelle Gehan.

Mission Sunday, the last Sunday in September, was made all the more special this year by a joint effort of some of our Christian education people and the members of our Missions Committee under the chair of Ruth Kabel. A wonderful "Missions Fair" was a big hit with many of our children in church school as well as with many of our adults who, during the coffee hour following the 10:30 service, became more familiar with a number of the organizations our congregation supports.

Also, along the line of missions, I want to report that our church was able to help thirteen households with fuel assistance over the 2010-11 winter season. We distributed certificates resulting in 2,500 gallons of fuel. For the 2011-12 season, thanks to the generosity of a local oil distributor as well as the increased giving of members and friends at the Christmas Eve services we will be able to distribute about 3,000 gallons of fuel. I continue to be the primary and confidential contact for people needing help. Please notify me if you are seeking assistance or are aware of someone who needs assistance.

I want to thank the church for the couple of weeks of continuing education/renewal time that I receive each year, including the week in July, when I join with other clergy, primarily from New England, for the Colloquy at the Craigville Conference Center on the Cape.

Last but not least, a word of thanks to John Balfour for the custodial services he provides and to Eileen Widner for her expertise and diligent administration of the church office and oversight of our church facilities.

God has blessed us. God has blessed us indeed! And so we move on trusting that as God has favored us in the past, God will be with us to do good things that are yet to be. Thanks be to God!

WARRANT

To the members of the Congregational Church of Hollis, New Hampshire, (United Church of Christ) qualified to vote in Church affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Church in said Hollis, New Hampshire, on Sunday, February 12, 2012, (snow date Sunday, February 19, 2012) at 11:45 a.m. to consider the following articles:

Article 1: To consider the reports of the elected officers, boards, committees and organizations connected with the Church.

Article 2: To elect all officers necessary for the ensuing year.

Article 3: To see if the Church will accept the proposed changes to the Church By-Laws pertaining to calling a Pastor and Interim Pastor:

Paragraphs (d) and (h) govern the procedures for selecting Search Committees for a permanent pastor and for an interim pastor. The intended procedure when the by-laws were revised was for the Board of Deacons, the Church Council and the congregation, in the case of the search for a permanent pastor, were to be involved. Unfortunately, due to drafting errors or transcription issues, this is not the case. The present procedure, per the by-laws section (d), excludes the participation of the Church Council. Section (h) omits the Board of Deacons from the process for the selection of the membership of a Search Committee for an interim minister.

ARTICLE VII – OFFICERS

Section 1: Pastor and Teacher

(d) When it becomes necessary to call a Pastor, the Board of Deacons shall prepare a slate of nominations of at least ten persons to be presented to the church as nominations for a Search Committee. The nominees shall include at least five members drawn from the elected lay leadership of the church and at least one youth member. The church can receive further nominations from its members. The church shall then elect a Search Committee, to consist of no less than ten members, which, upon examination, shall recommend a candidate to the church for its vote.

Recommended change:

(d) When it becomes necessary to call a pastor, the board of Deacons shall prepare a slate of nominations of at least ten persons and not more than fourteen persons to be presented to the Church Council as nominations for a Search Committee. The nominations shall include at least five members drawn from the elected leadership of the church (defined as any elected officer or committee member) and at least one youth member. The Church Council can receive further nominations from its members. The Church Council shall then recommend the membership of the Search Committee, consisting of ten to fourteen persons as defined above, to the church membership for approval at a special meeting of the membership of the church. The Search Committee, upon examination of candidates, will recommend a candidate for Pastor to the church membership for approval.

(h) If it becomes necessary to call an Interim Pastor, the Church Council shall select a Search Committee of at least five persons from the elected lay leadership of the Church. The Search Committee will, upon examination, recommend a candidate to the Church Council for its approval.

Recommended change:

(h) If it becomes necessary to call an interim Pastor, the Board of Deacons will prepare a slate of nominations of at least five persons to be selected from the lay leadership of the church (defined as any elected officer or committee member). The Church Council will review the slate of nominations proposed by the Board of Deacons and any other nominations proposed by its members and then appoint the membership of the Search Committee. The Search committee will, after examination of candidates, recommend a candidate to the Church Council for its approval.

Article 4: To see if the Church will accept the proposed changes to the Church By-Laws pertaining to Membership

ARTICLE V — MEMBERSHIP

Section 3: Duties and Membership Defined

Members are expected to be faithful in all the spiritual duties essential to the Christian life, to attend regularly the services of this church, to contribute toward the support of this church and its missions at home and abroad; and to share in its organized work. A member not contributing toward the support of the church or not worshipping with this church for two years may be considered an inactive member.

Recommended change:

The final sentence to read: A member not contributing toward the support of the church or not worshipping with this church for two years may, **by review of the Board of Deacons, be considered for inactive member status.**

Section 4: Membership Defined

(b) Inactive members-Any member who for a period of two years does not attend this church; and does not assist in any of the church activities; and according to the financial secretary's records, does not support the church financially shall be placed on the inactive list.

Recommended change:

(b) Inactive members-Any member who for a period of two years does not attend this church; and does not assist in any of the church activities; and according to the financial secretary's records, does not support the church financially **may, upon a majority vote of the Board of Deacons, be placed on the inactive list. Inactive members will not be included in the annual membership count that is reported to the Conference Office (UCC). After being on the inactive list for a period of two years, voting privileges are withdrawn and the inactive member is dropped from the church roll. Any former member who shows renewed interest in the church and desires to be reinstated as an active member may be so upon recommendation of the Pastor and a majority vote of the Board of Deacons.**

Section 5: Termination

The Board of Deacons, upon request of a member or church, may send a letter of transfer. Such letter will be addressed to the church and shall not be carried by a member. A member's name may be removed by request of that member as submitted to the Board of Deacons and shall be removed on death. Members who have been inactive for a period of three or more years as defined above may be removed from the church rolls by action of the Board of Deacons.

Recommended Change:

Change the last sentence to read, **Members who have been inactive for a period of two years may be removed from the church rolls by action of the Board of Deacons.**

ARTICLE VIII

Section 1: Board of Deacons

(d) The Board of Deacons shall receive and examine all requests for admission to church membership and accept into membership of the church persons they deem to be prepared for membership.

Recommended addition:

(d) **The Board of Deacons shall also be in charge of maintaining the church roll and determining which members are to be placed on the inactive list or dropped from the church rolls.**

Article 5: To see if the Church will accept and adopt the budget as recommended by the Trustees and Church Council.

Article 6: To see if the Church will authorize the Trustees to withdraw up to \$20,000 from the Trust Fund in 2012 to pay for a heating oil pre-buy contract if, in the opinion of the Trustees, that is a prudent expenditure.

Article 7: To consider any other business that may come before the meeting.

The following letter about summer church camps at Horton Center was just recently sent to NH UCC churches —

Members of the New Hampshire Conference, United Church of Christ:

We write to share important news regarding the future of the New Hampshire Conference Outdoor Ministries Program. At its regularly scheduled meeting last evening the Conference Council, with the support of the Outdoor Ministries Board, authorized the Conference Minister to enter into a three-year agreement with the Maine Conference for the active management of our Outdoor Ministries Program. This agreement with the Maine Conference provides ample time to develop and implement programs that offer safe and spiritually nourishing experiences for our camping community. An exciting new day is dawning in the life of Outdoor Ministries in the New Hampshire Conference, UCC!

The Rev. Bryan S. Breault, Director of the Maine Conference's Outdoor Ministries Program, will become Director of the New Hampshire Conference's Outdoor Ministries Program. Working with a New Hampshire-based Associate Director, he will oversee both programs. Bryan has directed Maine's Outdoor Ministries Program for some fourteen years. Under his stewardship, their program has become one of the strongest in any denomination in New England. Summer of 2012 will be a time of transformation at Horton Center. As such there will be no regular camping season at Horton Center in 2012. During this time we will work to ensure that all future programs we offer families, youth and children exceed health and safety guidelines, meet professional standards, and continue to be creatively engaging.

There will also be several work camp opportunities for individuals and groups to assist with physical renovation of Horton Center during the summer months. More information about these work experiences will be announced in The Weekly News. Giving Tree Program Success



A Message from the Trustees

The fall annual giving campaign fell roughly \$60,000 short of its projected goal. Church Council voted to present a balanced budget to the congregation at the upcoming annual meeting. The consequences of this are severe:

1. No salary adjustments, not even cost of living increases
2. No funding for Mission and Action
3. No funding for denominational support
4. The delay of needed maintenance projects such as the completion of painting of the exterior of the church
5. The reduction of the budgets of most church boards
6. No pre-buy of oil for the 2012-2013 season



The Trustees feel it is impossible to balance the needs of the church with the projected income from pledges. Our church budget is managed very conservatively, yet there are rising costs that are beyond our control such as health care premiums and utility bills. Additionally, our beautiful Meeting House is an older building that needs regular repairs and maintenance.

*We strongly urge every member of our church family to **prayerfully consider increasing their level of giving**, either through a readjustment in their yearly pledge or a one-time additional gift to help balance our budget.* While we recognize that current financial challenges may not allow some in our congregation to contribute more, we hope that all those who are able to do so will step forward and offer their support.
